The World is Never Enough



Because under the sun ...
 pleasure (2:1-3),
  achievement (2:4-11),
   wisdom (2:12-16),
    work (2:17-23),
       riches (5:10-12, 15)
         ... are all <u>hebel</u>: meaningless, fleeting, futile,
frustrating, pointless, absurd. They do not gain us
eternity, lasting fulfillment, or final meaning.
```

When Solomon tells us that all we do in life is ultimately *hebel*, he means that we should not expect to get from this world what it cannot give: eternity, lasting fulfillment, or final meaning. He does not mean that we should do nothing or that life cannot ever be enjoyed.



Life can and should be enjoyed when we have the means and opportunity to do so (2:24-25; 5:18-20; 9:7-10).

I. This is a weary and worn-out world. (1:1-11)

- Against the backdrop of an earth that remains "forever", human life and human history are transitory and futile.
- The cycles of nature flow on endlessly, never seeming to reach a goal or fulfillment.
- This world is weary and wearisome, and we are never satisfied with what it offers to our senses.
- Nothing new or unique happens in history; things only seem new because we forget the past.
