Key terms

- The “Self”

Thought of psychologically, the self is the individual as the object of his or her own reflective awareness.

Thought of theologically, the self is identified with one’s non-material soul; the enduring essence of who one truly is.

Traditional identity “markers”:

- biology/psychology (sex, physical attributes & abilities, mental capacities & abilities)
- family of origin
- race, ethnicity, nationality, culture
- religion
- local community
- personal relationships
- personal history
- personal character, commitments, & personality

Who am I?

I am who God says I am . . .

- I will become like who or what I worship (Ps. 115:1-8; Is. 6:9-13; Eph. 3:22-24; Phil. 3:20-21; 1 Jn. 3:2)
- I am known by God (1 Cor. 8:3, 13:12; Gal. 4:8-9)
- As a Christian, I am a child of God, in God’s family (Jn. 1:12-13; 1 Jn. 3:2)
- My identity is hidden in Christ and will be fully realized when he comes in glory (Is. 62:2; Col. 3:1-4; Rev. 2:17).
